Dear Rev. Fathers, Brothers, Sisters and Lay Faithful,



Assumption: A Gift or Credit?

The Assumption of Our Lady, celebrated by Catholics during this month, is indeed unique in the life of Mary, our divine mother. This is very well expressed by Pope Pius XII when he declared it as a dogma of the Catholic Church in 1950: "The Immaculate Mother of God, the ever-virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heaven." In this statement the Pope combines many of our faith expressions regarding Our

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Lady: Immaculate, Mother of God, ever-virgin, fulfilled her earthly life and finally assumed into heaven, both body and soul. Indeed, the Pope here articulates very vividly the various facts in Mary's life (being immaculate, ever-virgin but being the Mother of God) that led to the final stage of Assumption. However, the question remains whether this Assumption experienced by our divine Mother is a gift of God or a credit achieved in her earthly life?

Created World is Sinful!

The above title might look odd as we all know that God created everything good and there is nothing evil or even any defection in the created world (Gen 1:31). At the same time, we cannot forget the failure of misusing freedom of choice by our first parents (Gen 3:1-6) and this brought sin not only to the human beings (Rom 5:12) but also to the whole creation: "We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains" (Rom 8:22). Since "all have sinned, and *come short* of the glory of God" (Rom 3:23), St. Paul was struggling because of the conflict between good and evil in his personal life: "I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate" (Rom 7:15). This fact of sinfulness was expressed by many great people like St. Augustine and Martin Luther in the past and Pope Francis in the present. Considering this 'evil' state not only of human beings but also of the whole creation, it is very evident that no one can claim any credit for his/her achievements everything good, be it material, or social or spiritual, that we enjoy in life, is a gift of God.

Immaculate Mary!

The above consideration of our being contaminated by our first parents' sin (Original sin) will not fit in with Mary of Nazareth as she was conceived sinless and born immaculate. The effect of Original sin did not affect her. This is the reason for our faith that she did not taste death like every one of us, but as Pope Pius XII puts it very nicely: "after having completed the course of her earthly life" she was taken up to heaven body and soul. Some people would question how you can prove this. There are two considerations: i. God's revelation is not only based on the written tradition of the Word of God (Bible), but also is based on the living tradition of the faithful people. ii. Our Lady, from the moment of her 'fiatsurrender' to God's call never faltered in her vocation to be the mother of Jesus; she has become the mediator of Jesus' mercy and love to all those who invoke her; and she is the greatest witness to Jesus the Saviour and thus salvation to the world through her apparitions all over the world. Through these apparitions she not only brings solace to people by miraculous cures, but also motivates everyone to a life of prayer. In any case we recognize that her Immaculate Conception and also her vocation itself are free gifts of God. Moreover, we have to acknowledge that Mary, though not affected by Original sin, because of being created by God, her Assumption is also a gift of God.

Freedom of Choice!

Everything we have and what we are is a gift of God. No one can claim anything from God. St. Paul would clearly say: "it is only through the grace of God that I am now an apostle" (1 Cor 15: 9). In the same manner, Martin Luther completely ignored meritorious human efforts and relied only on the mercy of God. But God gave to humans freedom of choice (Gen 2:16-17) which underlines the human merits. This is the reason why Jesus comes to praise the "good and faithful servant" (Matt 25:23) and the Bible constantly speaks of the reward for faithful people (Ps 62:12; Prov 24:12; Rom 2:6; 1 Cor 5:10; 1 Pet 1:17; Rev 20:12).

The Assumption of Our Lady, a great honour given by God to Mary, is a gift of God; but at the same time it is to the credit of the New Eve because she utilized her choice of freedom in the right path of God's desire, unlike the old Eve. Freedom itself is a gift of God; but it should not be used according to the whims and fancies of one's mind and heart. Our Lady, with free choice, not out of any compulsion, took up all the challenges of being the mother of Jesus and lived splendidly so that she is rewarded by being taken up to heaven, body and soul and also by being the mother of God. We do not have freedom; but are given freedom by the Almighty and we are expected to use our freedom to build up ourselves and the society as per the mind of the Creator. Mary is the greatest model of how to use freedom of choice. By arrogant and selfish use of freedom one destroys not only oneself but also the whole society and creation itself. Thus, Mary's Assumption is both a gift of God and a merit she acquired by her committed life.
