BISHOP'S MESSAGE

Dear Fathers, Sisters and Brothers,

The Holy Mother the church celebrates on 4th of this month the feast of St. John Mary Vianney, patron saint of the parish priests. I wish all the parish priests a very happy feast.

The French Revolution in 18th century shattered the Catholic Church of old order. The revolution resulted in liberalism and democracy. The church lost in large measure the control over the daily life of the people. The process of secularism opened a new chapter and secular spirit continued to spread all over. Anti-clerical movement became strong. Many abandoned their priesthood and the Churches became the "Temple of Reasons". It was at this troubled movement in a poor family John Mary Vianney was born and due to the Revolution, he could not receive catholic education and could not even receive the first Holy Communion in public. He made secret confession and received the first Holy Communion secretly. He felt the call of God, but he struggled with Latin, and needed private tutoring to supplement his formal education. His studies were interrupted when he was taken into Napoleon's army in 1809, but after that he continued his priestly studies and became priest in 1815.

In 1818 he became the parish priest of a small village of Ars which he made it as a model parish by his holiness and the supernatural powers received from God. He worked tirelessly for the individual Christians and for the transformation of the parish. Many of the educated and daily laborers who had abandoned the church on account of the French revolution, he used to visit their houses and fields and he was preaching of the love and compassion of God. I remember the words of

His Holiness Pope Francis in *EVANGELII GAUDIUM* 'The Church 'goes forth' is a community of missionary disciples, who take the first step, who are involved and supportive, who bear fruit and rejoice.

We move forward, boldly take the initiative, go out to others, and seek those who are fallen away, stand at the cross road and welcome the outcast. Evangelization thus takes on the '**smell of the sheep**' and the sheep are willing to hear the voice. John Mary Vianney was after his sheep. People flocked to him for the confession and he used to spend 13-15 hours in the confessional. Many Bishops and priests used to come to him in secret to make a good confession. The rush of pilgrim to Ars was such that the civil authorities had to arrange special transportation to the village. Through his gently and godly service many sinners were converted, sick healed and many followed the life of holiness.

St. John Mary Vianney was neither a great preacher nor a good administrator, but he could transform his parish by his prayers, holiness and commitment to the people who was entrusted to him.

Often the image we create is of social worker, an efficient organizer and a good social mixer but the true image of course is the man of God and man of prayer. We have enough time to meddle with our mobile phones, on lap tops and attached to the Television, but how much zeal do we have for souls? How many of us visit our villages regularly? How much time do we spend in the confessional? How often we visit our catholic families? How much time do we spend in front of the Blessed Sacrament?

We ask our people to come to the Church and pray, but when do our people see us praying in the church? *Vatican II's 'Decree on the ministry and the life of priests*, expresses "the holy priest can alone save the world. Unless the Church has holy priests, she fails. The priest has not only to work for Christ, but also live and work with Christ.". "Without me you can do nothing". St John Mary Vianney is truly a hero of parish ministry. That is why he has been declared by the church as the model and patron of parish priests. Following his example, let us dedicate our lives in gaining our people and to enjoy eternal bliss with them.

HOLY MASS FOR MIGRANTS

HOMILY OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS

"You who trample upon the needy, and bring to ruin the poor of the land... Behold the days are coming... when I will send a famine on the land... a thirst for hearing the words of the Lord" (Amos 8:4.11).

Today this warning of the prophet Amos is remarkably timely. How many of the poor are trampled on in our day! How many of the poor are being brought to ruin! All are the victims of that culture of waste that has been denounced time and time again. Among them, I cannot fail to include the migrants and refugees who continue to knock at the door of nations that enjoy greater prosperity.



Five years ago, during my visit to Lampedusa, recalling the victims lost at sea, I repeated that timeless appeal to human responsibility: "Where is your brother? His blood cries out to me", says the Lord. This is not a question directed to others; it is a question directed to me, to you, to each of us (*Homily*, 8 July 2013). Sadly, the response to this appeal, even if at times generous, has not been enough, and we continue to grieve thousands of deaths.

Today's Gospel acclamation contains Jesus' invitation: "Come to me, all who labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (*Mt* 11:28). The Lord promises refreshment and freedom to all the oppressed of our world, but he needs us to fulfill his promise. He needs our eyes to see the needs of our brothers and sisters. He needs our hands to offer them help. He needs our voice to protest the injustices committed thanks to the silence, often complicit, of so many. I should really speak of many silences: the silence of common sense; the silence that thinks, "It's always been done this way"; the silence of "us" as opposed to "you". Above all, the Lord needs our hearts to show his merciful love towards the least, the outcast, the abandoned, the marginalized.

In the Gospel we heard, Matthew tells us of the most important day in his life, the day Jesus called him. The Evangelist clearly records the Lord's rebuke to the Pharisees, so easily given to insidious murmuring: "Go and learn what this means, 'I desire mercy, and not sacrifice'" (9:13). It is a finger pointed at the sterile hypocrisy of those who do not want to "dirty the hands", like the priest or the Levite in the parable of the Good Samaritan. This is a temptation powerfully present in our own day. It takes the form of closing our hearts to those who have the right,

just as we do, to security and dignified living conditions. It builds walls, real or virtual, rather than bridges.

Before the challenges of contemporary movements of migration, the only reasonable response is one of solidarity and mercy. A response less concerned with calculations, than with the need for an equitable distribution of responsibilities, an honest and sincere assessment of the alternatives and a prudent management. A just policy is one at the service of the person, of *every* person involved; a policy that provides for solutions that can ensure security, respect for the rights and dignity of all; a policy concerned for the good of one's own country, while taking into account that of others in an ever more interconnected world. It is to this world that the young look.

The Psalmist has shown us the right attitude to adopt in conscience before God: "I have chosen the way of faithfulness, I set your ordinances before me" (*Ps* 119,30). A commitment to faithfulness and right judgment that all of us hope to pursue together with government leaders in our world and all people of good will. For this reason, we are following closely the efforts of the international community to respond to the challenges posed by today's movements of migration by wisely combining solidarity and subsidiarity, and by identifying both resources and responsibilities. I would like to close with a few words in Spanish, directed particularly to the faithful who have come from Spain.

I wanted to celebrate the fifth anniversary of my visit to Lampedusa with you, who represent rescuers and those rescued on the Mediterranean Sea. I thank the rescuers for embodying in our day the parable of the Good Samaritan, who stopped to save the life of the poor man beaten by bandits. He didn't ask where he was from, his reasons for travelling or his documents... he simply decided to care for him and save his life. To those rescued I reiterate my solidarity and encouragement, since I am well aware of the tragic circumstances that you are fleeing. I ask you to keep being witnesses of hope in a world increasingly concerned about the present, with little vision for the future and averse to sharing. With respect for the culture and laws of the country that receives you, may you work out together the path of integration. I ask the Holy Spirit to enlighten our minds and to stir our hearts to overcome all fear and anxiety, and to make us docile instruments of the Father's merciful love, ready to offer our lives for our brothers and sisters, as the Lord Jesus did for each of us.

3. HEARTY CONGRATULATIONS & PRAYERFUL WISHES TO REV. MSGR. VIJAYA KUMAR RAYARALA, PIME, BISHOP ELECT OF SRIKAKULAM DIOCESE:

His Holiness, Pope Francis has appointed Rev. Msgr. Vijaya Kumar Rayarala, P.I.M.E., Regional Superior of the PIME as Bishop of the Diocese of Srikakulam. This provision was made public in Rome on Tuesday, 16th July 2019 at noon, corresponding to 15:30 hours, Indian Standard Time. Rev. Msgr. Vijaya Kumar Rayarala, PIME was born in Khammam, on 15th October, 1969. He joined St. John's Minor Seminary, Nidadavole, Eluru and then studied Philosophy at Jnana Deep Vidyapeeth, Pune. He continued his studies of Theology and Spirituality in the International Theologate of *Pontificio Istituto Missioni Estere* (PIME) in Monza (Italy) and made his final profession in the PIME on 1st October 1997. He was ordained priest in the Cathedral of Khammam on 29th August 1998. In 2003 he obtained a Licentiate in Biblical Theology from *San Luigi University*, Naples (Italy).

7. FEAST DAY OF ST JOHN MARY VIANNEY, THE CURÉ D'ARS (04-08-2019):

"The Priesthood is the love of the heart of Jesus", says St. John Mary **Vianney**. On the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, Friday 19 June 2009, a day traditionally devoted to prayer for the holiness of priests, Pope Benedict XVI inaugurated the Year for Priests in celebration of the 150th anniversary of St John Mary Vianney's death. Vianney died on 4th August 1859, and was canonized and declared the patron saint of parish priests in 1929 by Pope Pius XI. He was a tireless example of dedication to souls especially through the Sacrament of Confession. He lived a pious life and dedicated himself totally to the will of God. In 2009, when Pope Benedict XVI was opening the commemoration of the 150th anniversary of St. John Vianney's death, the Pope wrote a letter to Clergy, encouraging all priests to look to the Curé of Ars as an example of dedication to one's priestly calling.

Let us wish each other and excel in all his good qualities to remain as good and dedicated priests. Marking this great day, we wish a Very Happy Feast to all the pastoral clergy and are advised to have some meaningful celebrations in your respective parishes and deaneries.

8. INTERNATIONAL DAY OF THE WORLD'S INDIGENOUS PEOPLE 9TH AUGUST 2019:

The United Nations' (UN) International Day of the World's Indigenous People is observed on August 9 each year to promote and protect the rights of the world's indigenous population. This event also recognizes the achievements and contributions that indigenous people make to improve world issues such as environmental protection, peace and harmony. Indigenous cultures across the planet are recognized on International Day of the World's Indigenous People. Illustration based on artwork. The International Day of the World's Indigenous People falls on August 09, 2019 as this was the date of the first meeting in 1982 of the United Nations Working Group of Indigenous Populations. It is observed each year to promote and protect the rights of the world's indigenous population. This event also recognizes the achievements and contributions that indigenous people make to improve world issues such as environmental protection. People from different nations are encouraged to participate in observing the day to spread the UN's message on indigenous peoples. Activities may include educational forums and classroom activities to gain an appreciation and a better understanding of indigenous peoples.

Indigenous peoples, or Natives, are ethnic groups who are native to a land or region, especially before the arrival and intrusion of a foreign and possibly dominating culture. They are a group of people whose members share a cultural identity that has been shaped by their geographical region. A variety of names are used in various countries to identify such groups of people, but they generally are regarded as the "original inhabitants" of a territory or region. Their right to self-determination may be materially affected by the later-arriving ethnic groups. (Please find a circular in Regional and Global News)

9. 'BLACK DAY' OBSERVANCE ON 10TH AUGUST 2019:

August 10 day of mourning against discrimination of Christians and Dalit Muslim. "On August 10 we will observe a Black Day [day of mourning] since August 10, 1950 the President of India passed the infamous Art. 3 of the Constitution on Scheduled Castes (SC). It is a protest against the discrimination suffered by Dalit Christians and Muslims. The promoters are asking that black flags be displayed in a sign of mourning on Christian churches and other buildings, in meetings and at public events.

Christians in India usually suffer double discrimination: Not only do they suffer persecution because of their religion, but since the vast majority of Christians are Dalits - once known as "untouchables" - they also suffer harassment because of their caste. In India, Christians are approximately 2.3% of the population, of which around 60% are Dalits. And although Dalits are given preferential treatment under Indian law - similar to affirmative action policies in

the United States - this does not apply to Christians and Muslims. On August 10, 1950, the first president of India, Rajendra Prasad, signed a presidential order stating that anyone belonging to "a religion different from the Hindu religion shall be deemed to be a member of a Scheduled Caste." (Scheduled Caste is another term for Dalits.) Sikhs (1956) and Buddhists (1990) have since been allowed to also benefit from laws applying to Dalits. 10. NATIONAL YOUTH SUNDAY (11-08-2019):

The Youth Commission of the Conference of Catholic Bishops' of India (CCBI) which is the Episcopal conference of Bishops in India is celebrating the third National Youth Day on the second Sunday of August - August 11, which marks a day dedicated by the Bishops of India to all the young people nationwide. The day will be celebrated by the youth in their parishes, dioceses and institutions. Young people will gather in the churches and institutions on this day to celebrate the Holy Eucharist (a special youth mass) and organize various charities, fundraising events and to also pay visits to old age homes, orphanages and homes run by the missionaries of charity etc. "Young people will observe this day by organizing community programmes, recreation, outreach, fellowship, competitions, mela/fete etc, to celebrate their youthfulness and fellowship. The CCBI Youth Commission also urges all the faithful and religious leaders of the country to pray especially for all the young people across the world. It also invites young people to read the Apostolic Exhortation, a letter to young people by Pope Francis called 'Christus Vivit or Christ is Alive' following the 2018 Synod on Youth and reflect upon it in groups in creative ways," said Father Chetan Machado, CCBI Youth Commission secretary.

The theme for young people in India this year is 'I am the servant of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your Word' (Lk 1:38). This theme paves a way for young people to re-discover Christ, who is young and alive and therefore commit themselves to their call in life just as Mary did by her 'Yes' to the Lord, added Fr Machado. In his message to young people, Pope Francis in Christus Vivit says 'Do not just watch life from the balcony, but face it in the arena, accepting challenges and confronting trials. That is what Mary did, in her own youth, as she confronted her own questions and difficulties. May she renew your youthfulness by the power of her prayers and accompany you always by her maternal presence'(CV, §298).

He also talks about 'three great truths': God loves you; Christ is your Savior; He is alive (CV, §130). In a world where young people experience persistent turbulence and isolation, these three truths will make them feel loved. Even when they feel that they have messed up their lives, committed mistakes that have taken them far away, remembering that 'He always helps us to learn something even from our mistakes'. In his concluding message he tells the youth, "Dear young

people, my joyful hope is to see you keep running the race, out beating all those who are slow or fearful. The Church needs your momentum, your intuitions, and your faith. We need them!" CCBI Youth Commission is the chief organ of the CCBI that animates the youth apostolate across 132 dioceses and 14 ecclesial regions towards a deeper Christian awareness and commitment through faith formation. It aims to achieve its objective by working in close collaboration with the Regional Youth Commissions, Indian Catholic Youth Movement (ICYM) and other various Catholic Youth Movements in India.

11. PRISON MINISTRY SUNDAY INDIA (11-08-2019):

God hails the profound dignity of every human person, despite his or her cruelties even those condemned to death. Prison Ministry India, a national voluntary organization attempts to bear witness to the Truth that the worth of a human person is not measured by usefulness or talents, health or sickness, age or creed. We shall help prisoners to pick up the bits and pieces of his/her broken life to make a whole that is perfect and holy, his moral life. Prison Ministry India aims at reconciliation of the offender with the person he/she has offended the offended child with his/her family and the prisoner with God who hates the sin but loves and forgives the sinner. Therefore in prison, we want to instill hope for a prisoner without hope, to meet his creator who believes in him and created him in his image. On the occasion of Prison Ministry Sunday on 11th August 2019, kindly encourage the people to visit the prisons nearby and pray for our brethren behind bars. Special collection at the Parish level could be made and send to the diocesan office for the work of mercy.

12. MARY'S ASSUMPTION AND INDIA'S DAY OF INDEPENDENCE (15-08-2019):

The two events fall on 15th August. People must wake up to India's problems and learn to deal with violence, female infanticide, environmental degradation, etc. We celebrate two significant and related events. These are the Assumption of our Blessed Mother and Independence Day. Both are celebrated on the same date: August 15th. The reason why these events are related is because they are both about Freedom. Independence is celebrated as freedom from foreign rule and domination to self-rule and governance and the Assumption may be seen as a freedom from this limited and incomplete life to the bliss of eternal and perpetual life. The verses which make up the Gospel text of today are commonly known as "The Magnificat" or Mary's hymn of praise. It seems to have been modeled on the prayer of Samuel's mother, Hannah, in 1 Sam 2:1-10, and contains many Old Testament concepts and phrases. It communicates a picture of Mary as someone quite steeped in scripture. It reveals God primarily as a God of the poor. God is the one who will vindicate the poor by removing the rich and mighty from their positions and raising the lowly. Let the celebrations of Independence Day and the

Assumption of our Blessed Mother is wake-up calls for us to rouse ourselves from our slumber and do something tangible to right the wrongs.

13. ST. PIUS X, AUXILIARY PATRON OF OUR DIOCESE OF KURNOOL (21-08-2019):

Pope Saint Pius X was born in the town of Riese, which would later append as “Pio X” (Pius X’s name in Italian) to the town’s name. He was canonized in 1954. Pius X is known for vigorously opposing modernist interpretations of Catholic doctrine, promoting traditional devotional practices and orthodox theology. His most important reform was to order the codification of the first Code of Canon Law, which collected the laws of the Church into one volume for the first time. He was also considered a pastoral Pope, in the sense of encouraging personal holiness, piety and a daily lifestyle reflecting deep Christian values. Pius X was particularly devoted to the Blessed Virgin Mary under the specific title of Our Lady of Confidence; his papal encyclical *Ad diem illum* expresses his desire ‘through Mary to renew all things in Christ’, which he had defined as his motto in his first encyclical. Pius X was the only pope in the 20th century with extensive pastoral experience and implementation at the parish level. Pius X defended the Catholic faith against popular 19th- century attitudes and views such as indifferentism and relativism which his predecessors had warned against as well. Considered a holy person by many, public veneration of Pope Pius X began soon after his death. Let us invoke his intercession for the Church at large and very specially for our diocese that we may through Mother Mary renew all things in Christ.

14. JUSTICE SUNDAY (25-08-2019) UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST SERVICE COMMITTEE (UUSC).

Justice Sunday is a UUSC’s annual opportunity to engage you and your congregation in reflection and action. For many people in the Global North, economic justice is a phrase without any personal connection. But for millions of people around the world, it is the difference between living and dying. This Justice Sunday explores economic justice and be a part of the movement to help people all around the world realizes their rights. As the Universal Declaration of Human Rights declares, “Everyone has the right to work, to free choice of employment, to just and favorable conditions of work and to protection against unemployment.”

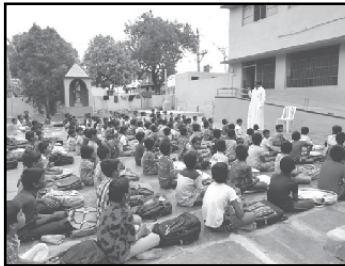

Brief Report on Southern Regional Body & Executive Meeting: Prison Ministry India – Southern India Regional Body & Executive Meeting under TCBC was held at Social Service Center, Gunadala, Vijayawada on 19th July 2019 by Rev. Fr. Pasala Lahastraya, AP State Coordinator, under the Chairmanship of Most Rev. Dr. Anthony Poola, Bishop of Kurnool, under the guidance of Mr. David Chaco, Southern India Regional Secretary and with the cooperation and collaboration of Rev. Fr. Pasala Thomas, Director of Social Service Centre and Diocesan Coordinator of Prison Ministry India, Vijayawada Diocese. Fr. Anthony swamy, Southern Regional and Tamilnadu State Coordinator, in his Presidential address gave a call for the Prison Ministry to reform and rehabilitate Prisoners that they become source of humanity in the society.

Sr. Lini Sheeja MSC, National Secretary of Prison Ministry India had PPT of the Brief History of Prison Ministry, brief introduction of Prison Ministry and about its functioning in India. This PPT impressed and inspired the participants a lot. Mr. K. Ashok Kumar, National Executive Member, presented PPT about the Prison Ministry, its role and functioning of the Prison Ministry in Andhra Church particularly Vijayawada Diocese. Rev. Fr. Francis Kodiyan MCBS, National Coordinator, after hearing experiences from each state coordinator from Southern India Regional Committee spoke about his initiative about the foundation of Prison Ministry and continuation of the Prison Ministry. REGIONAL, NATIONAL, AND GLOBAL NEWS

1. FEDERATION OF TELUGU CHURCHES (FTC):

Memorandum submitted to Sri Koppula Eshwer Garu Hon. Minister for Minority Welfare, Telangana State At T.S. Secretariat on 25-07-2019

The Federation of Telugu Churches (FTC), which is an apex body of the mainline Churches and major Christian Denominations in the twin Telugu States, is thankful to you for your commitment in championing the cause of secularism, democracy, and for protecting the rights of Minorities especially the Christian Minority Community. We are especially grateful to you for various welfare measures and development schemes that you implement through the A.P. State Christian (Minority) Finance Corporation and other government agencies.



As you are aware, the Christian Community, though a minority, contributes over 25% of charitable services to the society at large. Churches have been in forefront in providing education, health care and social welfare particularly to the poorer and weaker sections. To enable us to render these services in a more effective manner, we request you to assist us by addressing the following urgent concerns of the Christian Minority Community and taking immediate necessary steps:

1. Please make efforts to get the extension of SC status to the Dalit Christians (and Dalit Muslims) by bringing pressure on the Central Government to remove the long standing discriminatory practice, as promised by our beloved Chief Minister. Kindly get a resolution passed to this effect in the State Assembly to delete the unconstitutional and discriminatory Para 3 of Constitution

(Presidential) Order 19 of 1950 and send it to Honourable Prime Minister urging him to implement it.

2. Kindly get “Prevention of Communal Violence Act” and “Prevention of Minorities Atrocities Act” (in line with the “Prevention of SC ST Atrocities Act”) enacted in the State and Centre in order to prevent the continuing communal attacks on the Christians, Pastors and Christian institutions.

3. Please strengthen the T.S. State Christian (Minority) Finance Corporation allocating at least 25% of the funds and schemes under the Minority Welfare budget to the Christian Minority.

4. Kindly ensure the proper implementation of GO Ms No.341 in order to continue extending the government schemes and concessions granted to the Scheduled Castes to the Dalit Christians. Do ensure that land distribution is given to SC Christians and houses are constructed to the Christians and Pastors like they given to other SC communities.

5. Please resume the grant-in-aid to the Church-run Educational Institutions and fill-up the vacant aided teachers’ posts as directed by the Honourable High Court, through the Central Government funds available for under SSA / RTE.

6. Kindly remove the heavy burden of property tax and electricity tariff levied on the basis of commercial scale on the Church-run Educational Institutions which render educational service to the weaker sections on non-profit basis unlike the corporate schools. They may be charged on the basis of domestic scale and can be given subsidy for it.

7. Please allocate urgently government lands and funds for setting up of Christian burial grounds wherever needed, and for the construction of churches and educational institutions.

8. Kindly resume the scheme for providing subsidy for the Christian Pilgrimage to the Holy Land of Jerusalem and other places.

9. Please give representations to Christians in the legislative and civil bodies, administrative panels and in various commissions / boards. Christians must be included in various panels, commissions and boards, especially those concerning education, health and social welfare at Mandal, District and State levels. One co-option membership in every Municipality / Corporation must be given to a Christian to take care of Christian interests. At least a few Assembly and Lok Sabha seats must be assigned to them wherever Christians are in sizable number in the State.

50% of reservations in the nominated posts, nominated contracts and service contracts must be given to the SCs, STs, BCs and Minorities as it is being implemented in our neighboring State of Andhra Pradesh.

Dear Sir, the Archbishops / Bishops of the FTC and the Heads / Leaders of its member Churches assure you and the Government of Telangana wholehearted support and cooperation in the development of *Bangaru Telangana* full of prosperity, peace and harmony. 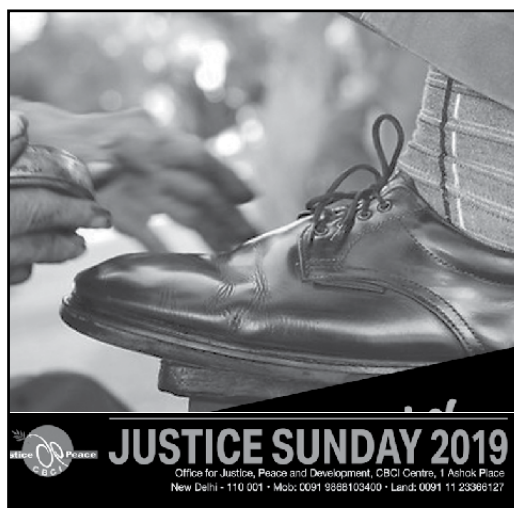
2. JUSTICE SUNDAY 18 AUGUST 2019:

Your Eminence/Grace/Excellency/Father/Sister/Brother in Jesus Christ, Greetings of Peace from the CBCI Office for Justice Peace and Development! Nearly 156 million young people in emerging and developing countries are working poor - working but living in extreme poverty on less than \$1.90 a day or in moderate poverty on \$1.90-\$3.10 a day. In the next 15 years, young people worldwide will need 600 million jobs. Millennial - people ages 18 to 34 in 2015 - are expected to work longer hours (nearly a quarter work more than 50 hours a week). The Center for Monitoring the Indian Economy estimates that the country's unemployment rate in December 2018 reached 7.38

POOR WORKING CONDITIONS LEADS TO LOSS OF HUMAN DIGNITY: Working conditions of many categories of people in India is pathetic. Recently, Indian doctors staged a nationwide strike over inhuman working conditions. The Indian healthcare sector is now facing the dual challenge of migration, attrition and drop-outs of nursing staff at government and private hospitals due to poor working conditions.²³ Further, "most daily-wage labourers in the organised sector in India suffer from poor working conditions and scanty wages. They are inordinately prone to occupational hazards, especially those working in construction, mining or chemical factories.

Their high exposure to risks and low incomes warrant special social-protection systems, not negligence"⁴. In the unorganized sector, the scenario is worse. At a rally in London, Nelson Mandela remarked: "Overcoming poverty is not a gesture of charity. It is an act of justice. It is the protection of a fundamental human right, the right to dignity and a decent life".

The ILO India Wage Report⁶ calls for sustainable wage policies that promote decent work and inclusive growth, as only such course of action can contribute to social justice, balanced economic growth and also offer protection to the workers in their employment relationship. It noted



that significant source of wage inequality can be found in exclusion or discrimination against some categories of workers, including women, ethnic minorities or castes. To reduce wage gaps, national legislation must provide for the right to equal remuneration for work of equal value and effective access to justice to claim this right.

3. International Day of the World's Indigenous People, 9th August: The United Nations' (UN) International Day of the World's Indigenous People is observed on August 9 each year to promote and protect the rights of the world's indigenous population. This event also recognizes the achievements and contributions that indigenous people make to improve world issues such as environmental protection, peace and harmony.

Indigenous peoples, or Natives, are ethnic groups who are native to a land or region, especially before the arrival and intrusion of a foreign and possibly dominating culture. They are a group of people whose members share a cultural identity that has been shaped by their geographical region. A variety of names are used in various countries to identify such groups of people, but they generally are regarded as the "original inhabitants" of a territory or region. Their right to self-determination may be materially affected by the later-arriving ethnic groups. Despite the diversity of Indigenous peoples, it may be noted that they share common problems and issues in dealing with the prevailing, or invading, society. They are generally concerned that the cultures of Indigenous peoples are being lost and that indigenous peoples suffer both discrimination and pressure to assimilate into their surrounding societies. It is also sometimes argued that it is important for the human species as a whole to preserve a wide range of cultural diversity as possible, and that the protection of indigenous cultures is vital to this enterprise. MESSAGE OF THE HOLY FATHER FRANCIS TO THE PARTICIPANTS IN THE SECOND FORUM OF THE LAUDATO SI' COMMUNITIES IN AMATRICE, ITALY

I address a cordial greeting to the organizers and participants in the second Forum of the Laudato si' Communities, which is being held in a territory devastated by the earthquake that struck Italy in August 2016, and which more than any other area has paid a very high price in terms of the number of victims.

It is a sign of hope, the fact that you are indeed in Amatrice, the memory of which is always present in my heart, to focus on the imbalances that devastate our "common home". Not only is it a sign of closeness to the many brothers and sisters who still live between the memory of a terrible tragedy and the reconstruction that is slow to get started, but it also expresses the desire to make resonate, loud and clear, that it is the poor who pay the highest price of environmental devastation. The wounds inflicted on the environment are inexorably wounds inflicted on humanity at its most defenceless. I wrote in the Encyclical Laudato si': "There can be no renewal of our relationship with nature without a renewal of humanity itself. There can be no ecology without an adequate anthropology" (118).

After facing, last year, the theme of the plastic that is suffocating our planet, today you reflect on the grave and no longer sustainable situation of Amazonia and the peoples who live there. You are thus inspired by the theme of the Synod of Bishops which will be held this coming October for the Pan-Amazon region, and whose Instrumentum laboris was recently presented.

The situation of Amazonia is a sad paradigm of what is happening in various parts of the planet: a blind and destructive mentality that favours profit over justice; it makes evident the predatory attitude with which man relates to nature. Please, do not forget that social justice and ecology are profoundly interconnected! What is happening in Amazonia will have repercussions at a global level, but it has already prostrated thousands of men and women, robbing them of their territory, making them strangers in their own land, impoverishing them of their own culture and their own traditions, and breaking the millennia-long equilibrium that united those peoples with their land. Man cannot remain an indifferent spectator in the face of this destruction; nor can the Church remain silent: the cry of the poor must resonate in her mouth too, as already highlighted by Saint Paul VI in his Encyclical *Populorum progressio*.....

CBCI OFFICE FOR EDUCATION AND CULTURE RESPONDS TO THE MHRD REGARDING THE DRAFT NEP 2019 ON BEHALF OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

Delhi, 28th July, 2019: A delegation of 6 persons led by Fr. J. Manipadam, National Secretary, CBCI Office of Education met the Honourable Minister for Human Resource Development in his chamber at Shastri Bhavan at 9.00 P.M. on 25th July and submitted a collated response regarding the draft NEP 2019 on behalf of the numerous Church run educational institutions across the country. The Catholic Church has some 30000 formal educational institutions which include Universities, Medical Colleges, Colleges and Schools not counting the thousands of educational services being rendered to the poor, the marginalized and rural youth by way of Special schools, Vocational training institutes, technical schools, institutes for street children and skill development institutes and start-up programmes and empowerment programmes towards self employment etc. The team felicitated Mr. Ramesh Pokriyal 'Nishank', the new Education Minister and handed over to him in person the collated response, along with the good wishes from the Christian community. The Minister received the delegation most cordially glanced through the 28 pages of responses, and assured that he would look into the suggestions received.



The responses submitted complimented the Drafting Committee headed by Dr. K. Kasturirangan, for attempting to give a holistic outlook to the needs and challenges and proposing a vision to make school education responsive to the modern times touching every aspect of education needing urgent action; for considering the UN General Assembly -1948 declaration that "everyone has the right to education; for taking into account the past National

Education Policy, The Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act, 2009, and the sustainable development goal 4 (SDG4); for proposing for greater funding, holistic education and bringing complete school education (from age 3+ to class 12) under RTE, providing also breakfast to children in addition to mid-day meals and ensuring that teachers are not involved in non-academic activities. The responses submitted also complimented the drafting team for proposing to make learning and assessment stress free with semester system of assessment at the secondary stage and targeting towards having everyone between the age of 3 and 18 in school by

2030. The proposals regarding higher education that receive much applause are the move to improve and encourage research, establishing the National Research Foundation with much bigger funding towards it; giving great stress on the quality of teacher education making it into a four year integrated course with graduation and proposals to revamp / simplify graduation courses and Accreditation process.

However some of the major internal contradictions pointed out and disapproval expressed were as follows:

- **Minority rights guaranteed in the Constitutions and the facilities guaranteed to the Minority communities to establish and administer educational institutions are very much overlooked and seemingly brushed aside** when the Draft NEP 2019 deals with appointments of staff, fee fixation, inclusion of Aided Minority (private) institutions into “public category” in the School Complex concept, formation of SMCs and other administrative and regulatory details....

Concluding thoughts:

- Is the Government abdicating its responsibility of educating the children of this nation say with a concept like School Complex and unbridled corporatisation and use of Volunteer services? Why such excessive centralisation? Is it a fairy tale NEP that bites more than what it can chew? Why is this draft silent on removal of caste system and other social evils? Why are all the Constitutional provisions overlooked regarding Minority Rights (SMCs, Fee fixation, Aided Minority schools in school complex...)? Are we succumbing to the demands of WTO-GATS and falling for excessive commercialization of education? Why is centuries of Christian contribution in education once again ignored? Why the drafting team did not include education providers from Minority Communities and Private School trusts and teachers who are in touch with the ground realities in education? What is the take away in this draft for the poor and the marginalised, the Tribals and Dalits and the differently abled? Is this Draft NEP compatible with the Constitutional Mandate of Federalism as the legal name of the country is Union of India? Is this draft NEP a pedagogical Policy or an administrative Policy?
- As Dr. B.R.Ambedkar stated, “Education is something which ought to be brought within the reach of everyone, the policy therefore, ought to be to make higher education as cheap to the lower classes as it can possibly be made. If all these communities are to be brought to the level of equality, then the only remedy is to adopt the principle of inequality and give favoured treatment to those who are below level”.
- The call of Jothiba Phule, Savithriba Phule, Shaheed Bhagat Singh, Mahatma Gandhi, Dr. B.R.Ambedkar, Maulana A.K. Azad and Thanthai Periyar is, “Education must be made Accessible to All and Affordable to All”. Can the National Education Policy 2019 get closer to this clarion call?

Appeal to observe August 10th as the "Day of Groaning"

Your Eminence/ Grace/ Excellency, Father/Brother/ Sister and Friends,

24th July 2019

Greetings from the CBCI Office for SC/BC.

On 10th August 1950 the then President of India signed the Constitution (Scheduled Castes) Order 1950 by which the government of India accorded the Scheduled Caste status only to Hindu Dalits, excluding Dalits of all other religions and depriving them of all the benefits of affirmative action like reservations, protection and promotion. This Presidential Order reads: *"No person who professes a religion other than Hinduism shall be deemed to be a member of the Scheduled Castes."* Later on it was amended and the Sikhs were included in 1956 and the Buddhists in 1990 in the Scheduled Castes lists.


This Order is an open violation of the secularism, enshrined in the Constitution of India, because by providing special benefits of affirmative action only to the Dalits of certain religions, the State promotes these religions. It is discriminatory in so far it deprives Dalit Christians and Dalit Muslims of the benefits of affirmative action, just because of their religion. Dalits of all religions suffer all the evils of caste system and socio-economic backwardness. But the Order does not treat them equally, but discriminates against Dalit Christians and Dalit Muslims. It violates the very rationale of affirmative action, i.e. socio-economic conditions, and brings religion as its basis. It lacks simple logic that the change of religion does not mean the change of castes. In fact one can change his/her religion but never the caste. Members of all tribal communities are rightly accorded Scheduled Tribe status even when they convert to Christianity, but a member of Scheduled Caste origin loses his/her Scheduled Castes status if he/she becomes a Christian. It defies all logic and common sense.

Millions of Dalit Christians and Dalit Muslims continue to suffer this exclusion and discrimination, purely on the basis of religion. They cannot practice freely the religion of their choice, as guaranteed by the Constitution. So the Order is unconstitutional. Ever since 1950, our pleading for the deletion of the Order has not yielded any result from the Government. The National Commission for Religious and Linguistic Minorities (NCRLM) 2007, headed by the former Chief Justice of India reported that the Constitution Scheduled Caste Order 1950 Para 3 is *'unconstitutional and it is a black letter written outside the Constitution introduced through the back door by an executive order,'* and recommended to the government to delete it *"so as to completely de-link the Scheduled Caste status from religion and make the scheduled castes net fully religion-neutral like that of the Scheduled Tribes."* The governments of different times have not shown sincerity in their appreciation and respect of the report and the recommendation of the learned Commission. A case was filed in the Supreme Court in 20104 challenging the constitutional validity of the Order and its hearing will take place in September. Please pray for it. Meanwhile, the helpless Dalit Christians continue to groan under the heavy weight of this gross injustice, hoping for the deliverance.

For the reason given above, August 10th was being observed every year as the "Black Day." However, in order not to sound prejudicial to the black colour and to avoid any racial connotation, last year it was observed as the "Day of Moaning." Again, the phrase "Day of Moaning" is associated with the dead. Thus, it is found appropriate to observe it as the "Day of Groaning."

I, therefore, request you all to observe August 10th as the **Day of Groaning** in your respective regions, dioceses and institutions, in solidarity with our suffering Dalit brothers and Sisters. The day can be observed with meetings, rallies, demonstrations, submitting memoranda, candle light vigils and other forms of innovative and effective expressions, left to your creativity.
