BISHOP'S MESSAGE

Lent is a special time for Christians: a time of grace, of conversion and of renewals. The Gospel teaches us to pray, do penance and give alms. The church calls us to fast and abstinence, personal and communal worship, the works of self-denial, daily mass and reach out to neighbors in need. The cry of the prophet Joel which the church uses to open this season of Lent, is “Rend your hearts, not your garments” (Joel 2:13). The external acts of penance such as fasting and alms giving must touch our hearts, not merely our external behaviors. Meanwhile amid the temptations and struggles of life, we should always remember that “God keeps his promise. He will not let you be tested beyond your strength. Along with the test he will give you way out of it so that you may be able to endure it. Let the lent be effective and special for everyone this year.

Every year we are also celebrating the feast of our Lady of Lourdes on 11th of February. Lourdes is one of the most beautiful little towns in the world and one of the most famous catholic pilgrim centers where Mother Mary appeared to the child of poor peasant called Bernadette in the region on 11th while she was gathering firewood. Bernadette saw **The Lady** in a sort of radiant mist high up in a rock in a grotto above the river. After the first day Mother Mary appeared to Bernadette in a series of apparitions. She spoke to the child saying, “Please come year every day for a fortnight. Go and tell the priest to build a chapel in this spot. Tell them to pray and do penance! Go and drink in the spring and wash in it.

I am the **IMMACULATE CONCEPTION**. A small and a powerful stream became most famous by the cures. It is famous because thousands of people have been reported cured instantly, permanently and completely of every known disease. They have been cured at the Shrine of Lourdes miraculously. Every year five to

six million people from different faiths and nations visit this universal shrine of the world. They visit this shrine with one common purpose-to be healed of their sicknesses and miseries. Medical Bureau of Lourdes has been established mainly to study and investigate scientifically the cures at Lourdes. Only after their thorough investigations a miracle is officially declared cured. This is the only shrine in the world where the Medical Bureau for the investigations of the cures is established. When it is cured be sure that it is authentic based on evidences.

The shrine has an answer not only for the physically sick and the suffering but for the ills and the problems of all the pilgrims. It has an answer for the world sickness and for our individual sickness also. That is why Pope John Paul II on 11th February initiated the day and declared it as the **WORLD DAY OF SICK** in 1992 to encourage people to pray for those who suffer from illness and for their care givers. The Pope himself was diagnosed with Parkinson's a year before, in 1991, and it is considered that his own illness was impetus for his designation of the day. Pope Francis in his message for the 27th World Day of the Sick, urges that those who care for the sick and give of themselves with generosity and straightforward love – like St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta - are amongst the Church's most credible evangelizers. Pointing out that each of us “is poor, needy and destitute” needing the care of our parents to survive when we are born and remaining in some way dependent on the help of others at every stage of life, Pope Francis said a frank acknowledgement of our limitations “keeps us humble and spurs us to practice solidarity as an essential virtue in life”. Pope Francis also highlighted the figure of Saint Teresa of Calcutta as a model of charity who made God's love for the poor and sick visible.

We are blessed in Kurnool that name of our Cathedral is Our Lady of Lourdes and she is also the patron saint of our diocese. She has been protecting and guiding us all through these years. Always we seek her blessings and guidance. She never ceased praising God for all the wonders He worked for her. We also must along with Mother Mary always say “for **He who is Mighty has done great things for me, and Holy is His name**”.

MESSAGE OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS FOR THE XXVIII WORLD DAY OF THE SICK 2020

11 February 2020

“Come to me, all you who labour and are burdened, and I will give you rest” (Mt 11:28)

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

1. Jesus’ words, “Come to me, all you who labour and are burdened, and I will give you rest” (Mt 11:28) point to the mysterious path of grace that is revealed to the simple and gives new strength to those who are weary and tired. These words of Christ express the solidarity of the Son of Man with all those who are hurt and afflicted. How many people suffer in both body and soul! Jesus urges everyone to draw near to him – “Come to me!” – and he promises them comfort and repose. “When Jesus says this, he has before him the people he meets every day on the streets of Galilee: very many simple people, the poor, the sick, sinners, those who are marginalized by the burden of the law and the oppressive social system... These people always followed him to hear his word, a word that gave hope! Jesus’ words always give hope!” (Angelus, 6 July 2014).



On this XXVIII World Day of the Sick, Jesus repeats these words to the sick, the oppressed, and the poor. For they realize that they depend entirely on God and, beneath the burden of their trials, stand in need of his healing. Jesus does not make demands of those who endure situations of frailty, suffering and weakness, but offers his mercy and his comforting presence. He looks upon a wounded humanity with eyes that gaze into the heart of each person. That gaze is not one of indifference; rather, it embraces people in their entirety, each person in his or her health condition, discarding no one, but rather inviting everyone to share in his life and to experience his tender love.

2. Why does Jesus have these feelings? Because he himself became frail, endured human suffering and received comfort from his Father. Indeed, only those who personally experience suffering are then able to comfort others. There are so many kinds of grave suffering: incurable and chronic diseases, psychological diseases, situations calling for rehabilitation or palliative care, numerous forms of disability, children’s or geriatric diseases... At times human warmth is lacking in our approach to these. What is needed is a personalized approach to the sick, not just of curing but also of caring, in view of an integral human healing. In

experiencing illness, individuals not only feel threatened in their physical integrity, but also in the relational, intellectual, affective and spiritual dimensions of their lives. For this reason, in addition to therapy and support, they expect care and attention. In a word, love. At the side of every sick person, there is also a family, which itself suffers and is in need of support and comfort.

3. Dear brothers and sisters who are ill, your sickness makes you in a particular way one of those “who labour and are burdened”, and thus attract the eyes and heart of Jesus. In him, you will find light to brighten your darkest moments and hope to soothe your distress. He urges you: “Come to me”. In him, you will find strength to face all the worries and questions that assail you during this “dark night” of body and soul. Christ did not give us prescriptions, but through his passion, death and resurrection he frees us from the grip of evil.

In your experience of illness, you certainly need a place to find rest. The Church desires to become more and more the “inn” of the Good Samaritan who is Christ (cf. Lk 10:34), that is, a home where you can encounter his grace, which finds expression in closeness, acceptance and relief. In this home, you can meet people who, healed in their frailty by God’s mercy, will help you bear your cross and enable your suffering to give you a new perspective. You will be able to look beyond your illness to a greater horizon of new light and fresh strength for your lives.

A key role in this effort to offer rest and renewal to our sick brothers and sisters is played by healthcare workers: physicians, nurses, medical and administrative professionals, assistants and volunteers. Thanks to their expertise, they can make patients feel the presence of Christ who consoles and cares for the sick, and heals every hurt. Yet they too are men and women with their own frailties and even illnesses. They show how true it is that “once Christ’s comfort and rest is received, we are called in turn to become rest and comfort for our brothers and sisters, with a docile and humble attitude in imitation of the Teacher” (Angelus, 6 July 2014).

4. Dear healthcare professionals, let us always remember that diagnostic, preventive and therapeutic treatments, research, care and rehabilitation are always in the service of the sick person; indeed the noun “person” takes priority over the adjective “sick”. In your work, may you always strive to promote the dignity and life of each person, and reject any compromise in the direction of euthanasia, assisted suicide or suppression of life, even in the case of terminal illness.

When confronted with the limitations and even failures of medical science before increasingly problematic clinical cases and bleak diagnoses, you are called to be open to the transcendent dimension of your profession that reveals its ultimate meaning. Let us remember that life is sacred and belongs to God; hence it is inviolable and no one can claim the right to dispose of it freely (cf. Donum

Vitae, 5; Evangelium Vitae, 29-53). Life must be welcomed, protected, respected and served from its beginning to its end: both human reason and faith in God, the author of life, require this. In some cases, conscientious objection becomes a necessary decision if you are to be consistent with your “yes” to life and to the human person. Your professionalism, sustained by Christian charity, will be the best service you can offer for the safeguarding of the truest human right, the right to life. When you can no longer provide a cure, you will still be able to provide care and healing, through gestures and procedures that give comfort and relief to the sick.

Tragically, in some contexts of war and violent conflict, healthcare professionals and the facilities that receive and assist the sick are attacked. In some areas, too, political authorities attempt to manipulate medical care for their own advantage, thus restricting the medical profession’s legitimate autonomy. Yet attacking those who devote themselves to the service of the suffering members of society does not serve the interests of anyone.

5. On this XXVIII World Day of the Sick, I think of our many brothers and sisters throughout the world who have no access to medical care because they live in poverty. For this reason, I urge healthcare institutions and government leaders throughout the world not to neglect social justice out of a preoccupation for financial concerns. It is my hope that, by joining the principles of solidarity and subsidiarity, efforts will be made to cooperate in ensuring that everyone has access to suitable treatments for preserving and restoring their health. I offer heartfelt thanks to all those volunteers who serve the sick, often compensating for structural shortcomings, while reflecting the image of Christ, the Good Samaritan, by their acts of tender love and closeness.

To the Blessed Virgin Mary, Health of the Sick, I entrust all those who bear the burden of illness, along with their families and all healthcare workers. With the assurance of a remembrance in my prayers, I cordially impart my Apostolic Blessing.



1. 28TH WORLD DAY OF THE SICK IS CELEBRATED ON 11TH FEBRUARY 2020:

As per the direction and instructions given by the Holy Father Pope Francis, we need to observe the 28th World Day of the Sick on 11th February, 2020 (The Feast Day of our Lady of Lourdes). The theme given by Holy Father for the World Day of the Sick is "Come to me, all you who labour and are burdened, and I will give you rest" (*Mt 11:28*) these words of Christ express the solidarity of the Son of Man with all those who are hurt and afflicted. How many people suffer in both body and soul! Jesus urges everyone to draw near to him – "Come to me!" – And he promises them comfort and repose. "When Jesus says this, he has before him

the people he meets every day on the streets of Galilee: very many simple people, the poor, the sick, sinners, those who are marginalized *by the burden of the law and the oppressive social system*. All the Parish Priests/ Heads of the Institutions are called upon to announce and observe the World Day of the Sick on 11th February 2020 in all our Churches/ Institutions. All the priests are requested to highlight, during homily, the message given by the Holy Father Pope Francis.

2. LENT: 26TH FEBRUARY 2020:

Every spring, many Christians from different denominations celebrate Lent. Although you might have heard of—or even observe—the holiday, there's quite a bit to know about the Lenten season that leads up to Easter Sunday. Here's a look at the holy time that will occur from Wednesday, February 26, to Thursday, April 9, 2020. This year, **Lent begins on Wednesday, February 26, 2020**. But before Lent even begins, there's Shrove Tuesday, the day before Lent, which is a time to “clean the soul,” according to the *BBC*. The first day of Lent is called Ash Wednesday. On Ash Wednesday, priests gather ashes from the previous Palm Sunday (more on that later) and rub them on the congregant's foreheads.

They do this while citing Genesis 3:19: “...For you are dust, and to dust you shall return.” In addition to heading to church, many honor the beginning of Lent by choosing to give up something for the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness, such as alcohol, sweets, or even swearing. Another option is to give them to a cause, which could include volunteering. The key is to focus time on repenting for our sins and consecrating ourselves to God, not on trying to earn God's favour or increase His love for us. Let us take this Lenten season to open our eyes and truly see good everywhere and see God and as our self and in everyone everywhere. Make this your season to a resurrected Christ Consciousness.

1. CHURCH URGED TO PROMOTE SOLIDARITY AND SECULARISM IN OUR COUNTRY: CARDINAL OSWALD GRACIAS:

Benaulim, Goa 9 January, 2020: Inaugurating the Conference of Catholic Bishops of India's (CCBI) Secretariat Extension in Benaulim, Goa His Eminence Oswald Cardinal Gracias the Archbishop of Bombay and the President of the CBCI urged the Church in India to promote solidarity and respect all in our country. "The Citizenship Amendment Act is a cause of great anxiety for all citizens and there is a danger that there could be a polarization of our peoples along religious lines, which is very harmful for the country. It is the responsibility of all to promote solidarity and respect for all in our country" said Cardinal Oswald.

He also requested all Christian faithful to continuously pray for our country to prevail peace and harmony. Shanti Sadan (House of Peace), the CCBI Secretariat Extension in Benaulim was dedicated to the Service of the Church in India by Cardinal Oswald Gracias in the presence of 12 Bishops, priests, religious and lay faithful. His Grace Most Rev. Filipe Neri Ferrão, the President of the CCBI and the Archbishop of Goa, unveiled the plaque and blessed the ground floor. His Grace Most Rev. George Antonysamy, the Vice President of the CCBI and the Archbishop of Madras Mylapore blessed the first floor and gave homily during the celebration of the Holy Eucharist. His Grace Most Rev. Anil Couto, the Secretary General of the CCBI and the Archbishop of Delhi, blessed the second floor.

The three story building has 25 self-contained rooms and can accommodate 40 persons. It has a chapel, conference and dining halls. The new Secretariat Extension building is situated in Benaulim, the birth place of St. Joseph Vaz, the Apostle of Sri Lanka. It is 17 kilometres from the Goa airport and 4 kilometres from the city railway station. The Episcopal Conference will organise small animation and training programmes from Shanti Sadan. The CCBI has five Secretariat buildings in India, Suvarta Kendra, Pachmarhi, Madhya Pradesh is the Secretariat of the CCBI Commission for Proclamation. Bethania, Faridabad, New Delhi is the CCBI Youth Commission Secretariat, PMO Secretariat, Ulsoor, Bangalore, is the Secretariat of the Pontifical Mission Organisation (PMO). The Headquarters of the CCBI is the CCBI Centre,

Bangalore from where the Deputy Secretary General and four other Commission Secretaries operate.

There are 16 Commissions and 3 Departments under the CCBI where 23 personnel are working as Executive Secretaries or Directors.

The Conference of Catholic Bishops of India (CCBI) is canonically the National Episcopal Conference for the Latin Church. It is the largest Bishops Conference in Asia and the fourth largest in the world. It consists of 132 dioceses with 190 bishops. *(- Rev. Dr. Stephen Alathara Deputy Secretary General, CCBI)*

2. POPE ASKS CARDINAL GRACIAS TO CONTINUE AS BOMBAY ARCHBISHOP

Pope asks Cardinal Gracias to continue as Bombay Archbishop Church leaders in India have welcomed Pope Francis asking Cardinal Oswald Gracias to continue as the Bombay archdiocese. It is good news. We welcome the cardinal's extension as the Archbishop of Bombay," Bishop Allwyn D'Silva told Matters India on January 28, responding to the Pope's decision. Cardinal Gracias had on November 30, 2019, submitted to the Pope in person his resignation from the archbishop's post as he was to complete 75 years on December 24 the same year.

A letter from the Congregation for the Evangelization of Peoples to Cardinal Gracias says the "Holy Father has asked you to continue 'donec aliter provideatur (until other provision is made).'" The congregation's December 6 letter expresses its gratitude to the cardinal for what he is doing for the service of the Church in Mumbai, in India and the Universal Church. "Permit me to add my own personal esteem and affection," said Cardinal Filoni Fernando, prefect of the Vatican congregation. Bishop D'Silva, one of the auxiliaries of Bombay archdiocese, says people in Mumbai had expected the extension because of the cardinal's caliber, knowledge, and experience of Church affairs both in India and the Universal Church. The environmentalist-turned prelate hailed the cardinal as "an effective spiritual leader, who is respected across the political spectrum in India and abroad. Gracias has guided the church in India with courage and prudence." Cardinal Gracias is one of the six advisers of Pope Francis. He is the president of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of India, which is scheduled to hold its biennial plenary meeting in Bengaluru mid February. The cardinal is eligible for another term as the head of the Indian Catholic Church as he continues as the Bombay archbishop. Until a

year ago, he was the president of the Federation of Asian Bishops' Conferences. Gracias Gracias was born in Mumbai to Jervis and Aduzinda Gracias of Goan origins. He completed his school studies at St. Michael's School in Mahim and joined Jesuit-managed St. Xavier's College, Mumbai.

Let us listen to the Holy Father Pope Francis

MESSAGE OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS FOR LENT 2020

"We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God" (2 Cor 5:20)

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

This year the Lord grants us, once again, a favorable time to prepare to celebrate with renewed hearts the great mystery of the death and resurrection of Jesus, the cornerstone of our personal and communal Christian life. We must continually return to this mystery in mind and heart, for it will continue to grow within us in the measure that we are open to its spiritual power and respond with freedom and generosity.

1. The paschal mystery as the basis of conversion Christian joy flows from listening to, and accepting, the Good News of the death and resurrection of Jesus. This kerygma sums up the mystery of a love "so real, so true, so concrete, that it invites us to a relationship of openness and fruitful dialogue" (Christus Vivit, 117). Whoever believes this message rejects the lie that our life is ours to do with as we will. Rather, life is born of the love of God our Father, from his desire to grant us life in abundance (cf. Jn 10:10). If we listen instead to the tempting voice of the "father of lies" (Jn 8:44), we risk sinking into the abyss of absurdity, and experiencing hell here on earth, as all too many tragic events in the personal and collective human experience sadly bear witness. In this Lent of 2020, I would like to share with every Christian what I wrote to young people in the Apostolic Exhortation Christus Vivit: "Keep your eyes fixed on the outstretched arms of Christ crucified, let yourself be saved over and over again. And when you go to confess your sins, believe firmly in his mercy which frees you of your guilt. Contemplate his blood poured out with such great love, and let yourself be cleansed by it. In this way, you can be reborn ever anew" (No. 123). Jesus' Pasch is not a past event; rather, through the power of the Holy Spirit it is ever present, enabling us to see and touch with faith the flesh of Christ in those who suffer.

2. The urgency of conversion It is good to contemplate more deeply the paschal mystery through which God's mercy has been bestowed upon us. Indeed, the experience of mercy is only possible in a "face to face" relationship with the crucified and risen Lord "who loved me and gave himself for me" (Gal 2:20), in a heartfelt dialogue between friends. That is why prayer is so important in Lent. Even more than a duty, prayer is an expression of our need to respond to God's love which always precedes and sustains us. Christians pray in the knowledge that, although unworthy, we are still loved. Prayer can take any number of different forms, but what truly matters in God's eyes is that it penetrates deep within us and chips away at our hardness of heart, in order to convert us ever more fully to God and to his will. In this favorable season, then, may we allow ourselves to be led like Israel into the desert (cf. Hos 2:14), so that we can at last hear our Spouse's voice and allow it to resound ever more deeply within us. The more fully we are engaged with his word, the more we will experience the mercy he freely gives us. May we not let this time of grace pass in vain, in the foolish illusion that we can control the times and means of our conversion to him.

3. God's passionate will to dialogue with his children The fact that the Lord once again offers us a favorable time for our conversion should never be taken for granted. This new opportunity ought to awaken in us a sense of gratitude and stir us from our sloth. Despite the sometimes tragic presence of evil in our lives, and in the life of the Church and the world, this opportunity to change our course expresses God's unwavering will not to interrupt his dialogue of salvation with us. In the crucified Jesus, who knew no sin, yet for our sake was made to be sin (cf. 2 Cor 5:21), this saving will led the Father to burden his Son with the weight of our sins, thus, in the expression of Pope Benedict XVI, "turning God against himself" (Deus Caritas Est, 12). For God also loves his enemies (cf. Mt 5:43- 48). The dialogue that God wishes to establish with each of us through the paschal mystery of his Son has nothing to do with empty chatter, like that attributed to the ancient inhabitants of Athens, who "spent their time in nothing except telling or hearing something new" (Acts 17:21). Such chatter, determined by an empty and superficial curiosity, characterizes worldliness in every age; in our own day, it can also result in improper use of the media.

4. A richness to be shared, not kept for oneself Putting the paschal mystery at the center of our lives means feeling compassion towards the wounds of the crucified Christ present in the many innocent victims of wars, in attacks on life, from that of the unborn to that of the elderly, and various forms of violence.

They are likewise present in environmental disasters, the unequal distribution of the earth's goods, human trafficking in all its forms, and the unbridled thirst for profit, which is a form of idolatry. Today too, there is a need to appeal to men and women of good will to share, by almsgiving, their goods with those most in need, as a means of personally participating in the building of a better world. Charitable giving makes us more human, whereas hoarding risks making us less human, imprisoned by our own selfishness.

We can and must go even further, and consider the structural aspects of our economic life. For this reason, in the midst of Lent this year, from 26 to 28 March, I have convened a meeting in Assisi with young economists, entrepreneurs and change-makers, with the aim of shaping a more just and inclusive economy. As the Church's magisterium has often repeated, political life represents an eminent form of charity (cf. Pius XI, Address to the Italian Federation of Catholic University Students, 18 December 1927). The same holds true for economic life, which can be approached in the same evangelical spirit, the spirit of the Beatitudes. I ask Mary Most Holy to pray that our Lenten celebration will open our hearts to hear God's call to be reconciled to himself, to fix our gaze on the paschal mystery, and to be converted to an open and sincere dialogue with him. In this way, we will become what Christ asks his disciples to be: the salt of the earth and the light of the world (cf. Mt 5:13-14).

2. Pope sets special day to study Bible: Pope Francis has set a special day to the celebration, study and dissemination of the word of God: "The newly established "Sunday of the Word of God" is an invitation to Catholics across the world to deepen their appreciation, love and faithful witness to God and his word, Pope Francis said. By papal decree, the third Sunday in Ordinary Time — January 26 this year — is to be observed as a special day devoted to the Bible study. A day dedicated to the Bible will help the church "experience anew how the risen Lord opens up for us the treasury of his word and enables us to proclaim its unfathomable riches before the world," the pope said in the document establishing the special Sunday observance. Dioceses and parishes have been invited to respond with creative initiatives, helpful resources and renewed efforts for helping Catholics engage more deeply with the Bible at church and in their lives. Archbishop Rino Fisichella, president of the Pontifical Council for Promoting New Evangelization, said added emphasis on the importance of the word of God is needed because "the overwhelming majority" of Catholics are not familiar with sacred Scripture. For many, the only time they hear the word of God is when they attend Mass, he told

Vatican News September 30, when the papal document, titled “Aperuit Illis,” was published. “The Bible is the most widely distributed book, but it’s also perhaps the one most covered in dust because it is not held in our hands,” the archbishop said.

With this apostolic letter, the pope “invites us to hold the word of God in our hands every day as much as possible so that it becomes our prayer” and a greater part of one’s lived experience, he said. In his letter, Pope Francis wrote, “A day devoted to the Bible should not be seen as a yearly event but rather a yearlong event, for we urgently need to grow in our knowledge and love of the Scriptures and of the risen Lord, who continues to speak his word and to break bread in the community of believers.” “We need to develop a closer relationship with sacred Scripture; otherwise, our hearts will remain cold and our eyes shut, struck as we are by so many forms of blindness,” he wrote. Sacred Scripture and the sacraments are inseparable, he wrote. Jesus speaks to everyone with his word in sacred Scripture, he said, and if people “hear his voice and open the doors of our minds and hearts, then he will enter our lives and remain ever with us.” Pope Francis urged priests to be extra attentive to creating a homily each Sunday that “speaks from the heart” and really helps people understand Scripture “through simple and suitable” language.

3. Pope Francis: Every human has an irrepressible dignity: Pope Francis emphasized the importance of each person’s dignity Friday in his message for World Communications Day: “In the history of every person, the Father sees again the story of his Son who came down to earth. Every human story has an irrepressible dignity,” Pope Francis said in the message signed Jan. 24. The pope said it is important for each person to remember who and what they are in God’s eyes and to bear witness to what the Holy Spirit has written in their hearts. “In order to do this, let us entrust ourselves to the woman who knit together in her womb the humanity of God,” Francis said. “O Mary, woman and mother, you wove the divine Word in your womb, you recounted by your life the magnificent works of God ... Look at the tangled knots in our life that paralyze our memory. By your gentle hands, every knot can be untied,” Pope Francis wrote in a prayer at the end of the message.

Pope Francis focused on storytelling as an essential part of the human experience in his message for World Communications Day. The message was published on Jan. 24 for the feast of St. Francis de Sales, the patron of writers,

journalists, and the Catholic press. “Amid the cacophony of voices and messages that surround us, we need a human story that can speak of ourselves and of the beauty all around us,” he said. Much of the pope’s reflections on storytelling centered on the Bible as the quintessential human story. “Sacred Scripture is a Story of stories,” he said. “It shows us from the very beginning a God who is both creator and narrator. Indeed, God speaks his word and things come into existence.” “The Bible is thus the great love story between God and humanity. At its centre stands Jesus, whose own story brings to fulfilment both God’s love for us and our love for God,” Pope Francis said. The pope encouraged men and women in every generation to memorize the most significant episodes recounted in Sacred Scripture to better communicate its meaning. He said that Jesus taught in parables, stories taken from everyday life.

“Our own story becomes part of every great story. As we read the Scriptures, the stories of the saints, and also those texts that have shed light on the human heart and its beauty, the Holy Spirit is free to write in our hearts, reviving our memory of what we are in God’s eyes,” he said.

4. Pope Francis: When we do not worship God, we worship ourselves: On the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord, Pope Francis said worship of Christ reveals the true meaning of our journey of life, as it did for the magi in the Gospel. “When we do not worship God, we end up worshiping ourselves,” Pope Francis said Jan. 6 in St. Peter’s Basilica. “Worship means concentrating on what is essential,” he said. “In worship, we learn to reject what should not be worshiped: the god of money, the god of consumerism, the god of pleasure, the god of success, the god of self. Worship means bending low before the Most High and to discover in his presence that life’s greatness does not consist in having, but in loving.” In his homily for the Epiphany of the Lord, Pope Francis reflected on the magi, or wise men, who bearing gifts, came to worship the Child Jesus in Bethlehem.

The Magi brought gold to the Lord to tell him that nothing is more precious than he, the pope said. They offered him incense to tell him that only in union with him can our lives rise up to heaven, and healing myrrh to promise Christ aid to marginalized and suffering neighbors in whom he himself is present. “In worshiping, we too will discover, like the Magi, the meaning of our journey. And like the Magi, we too will experience ‘a great joy,’” Francis said.

“Worship means realizing that you and God belong together to one another. It means being able to speak to him freely and intimately,” he said. “Worship means

discovering that, in order to pray, it is enough to say: 'My Lord and my God,' and to let ourselves be pervaded by his tender love." "Through worship, we discover that the Christian life is a love story with God," the pope said. "This is what the Church ought to be, a worshiper in love with Jesus her spouse." Pope Francis said that worship is an act of love that transforms one's life. "In worship, we allow Jesus to heal and change us ... to kindle light amid our darkness, to grant us strength in weakness and courage amid trials." "Once we lose the sense of worship, we lose our direction in the Christian life, which is a journey towards the Lord, not towards ourselves," the pope said. "This is a grave risk," he said. "We use God instead of serving him ... How many times have we confused God's power, which is for serving others, with power of this world, which is for serving ourselves."...

5. Pope Francis: It is beautiful when babies cry at Mass: Pope Francis baptized 32 babies in the Sistine Chapel Sunday, telling parents not to worry if their children cry at Mass. "Let the children cry," the pope said. "It is a beautiful homily when a child cries in church, a beautiful homily." On the feast of the Baptism of the Lord, Pope Francis celebrated Mass on Jan. 12 with the parents and godparents of 17 boys and 15 girls, who were baptized surrounded by Michelangelo's frescoes. "Just as Jesus went to receive baptism, you bring your children," Francis said. "The power of the Holy Spirit comes to defend them for the rest of their lives." "This is why it is so important to baptize them as babies because they grow with the power of the Holy Spirit," the pope added. Pope Francis said that he wanted to keep his homily short because the babies might not feel

comfortable in their baptism gowns and in a new environment. “Babies are not used to coming to the Sistine Chapel,” he joked. The pope reminded the parents that their personal example at home will help their child to grow in faith. He said that baptizing a child is an act of justice because the child receives the pledge of the Holy Spirit through the sacrament. Each of the 32 baptized infants are children of Vatican employees born in 2019. St. John Paul II began the papal tradition of baptizing children in the Sistine Chapel on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. Following the Mass, Pope Francis prayed the Angelus prayer from the window of the Vatican’s Apostolic Palace with pilgrims gathered in St. Peter’s Square.

6. Pope Francis prays for coronavirus victims in China: Pope Francis prayed Sunday for people infected by the coronavirus, which has killed 56 people in China. “May the Lord welcome the deceased in his peace, comfort families and support the great commitment of the Chinese community, already put in place to fight the epidemic,” Pope Francis said in his Angelus address Jan. 26. Originating in the Chinese city of Wuhan, the virus has spread to nine countries with 1,975 confirmed cases. The World Health Organization’s latest report Jan. 25 stated that among the confirmed cases, 237 people have been reported as severely ill. The number of people with coronavirus has increased by 655 cases in the 24-hours since the WHO report’s release, the Chinese government reported Jan. 26, one day after Lunar New Year. Hundreds of millions of people travel for the holiday, which is the biggest celebration of the year in China.
