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Bishop Speaks...

Dear Rev. Father, Brothers, Sisters and Lay Faithful,



Passion? No!

The Christian meaning of the word 'passion' refers to the terrible suffering of Jesus Christ. Who would want to undergo such suffering/passion in life? People are unwilling to face life's painful truth. We do not want to confront our fears, even imaginative fears; so, we end up as great dreamers and talkers but weak doers. Consequently, when suffering and pain confront us we either complain about life or curse God. However, the passion of Christ very strongly underlines the necessity and nobility of suffering in our life. In fact, the passion of Christ helps

us not only to accept suffering but to face trials and tribulations with deep faith and fortitude.

The Fact of Jesus' Passion!

We cannot forget Mel Gibson's amazing movie: *The Passion of the Christ*, released in 2004. It is a vivid description of the last twelve hours of Christ's cruel passion. Some of my friends said they could not continue watching it. Jesus is depicted undergoing horrific torture, both physical and mental. No doubt, the Gospels describe the passion of Christ much more graphically and realistically than that of his infancy narratives. Indeed the passion of Christ begins at Incarnation when the divine Christ came down and took the form of a weak human being (Jn 1:14; Phil 2:6-8). This could be called the 'death' of God and birth of the saviour!

Suffering is very much associated with the figure of the Son of Man (cf. Isa 53 & Dan 7). This suffering motif is sealed by Jesus himself when he predicted thrice about the inevitability of his suffering and death (Cf. Mt 16:21-23; 17:22-23; 20:17-19) and is also indicated by the anointing at Bethany (Mt 26:6-13). Humanly speaking, we come to understand that the antagonism (Jn 11:48-50) and thereafter the conspiracy of the Jews (Mk 3:6; Lk 22:1-2), followed by the betrayal of Judas (Mk 14:10-11) lead to Jesus' passion and death. The cruel treatment of the Pharisees, Pilate, soldiers and bystanders all increased Jesus' suffering so much that no human being in world history would undergo such pain. Moreover, his first cry on the Cross: "My God, my God..." (Mk 15:34), exhibits the severity of his passion.

Mercy Overcomes Passion!

Herman Hendrickx (*The Passion Narratives of the Synoptic Gospels*, 140) would aptly note the insensitivity of this cruelty: "The Mark an narrative does not leave the slightest doubt that an enormous injustice is being committed. Jesus is not only innocent, a victim sacrificed to the hatred of the Jewish leaders, but it is the Messiah, God's Son, who suffers this injustice." Son of Man as Son of God suffered. Jesus' whole life-history is a way of the Cross. In fact he wondered (*thaumazo*) at the unbelief of people's faith (Mk 6:6); wept at the tomb of Lazarus (Jn 11:35); lamented over Jerusalem (Lk 13:34); prayed to the Father to take away the cup of suffering (Lk 22:42) and as noted above, even raised a cry (*Sagne*) of severe pain (Mk 15:34). But, as Raymond Brown would note, the cry of Jesus on the cross is not a reproach against God, but the explosion of suffering in love (cf. *The Death of the Messiah, II*, 1047).

Jesus was neither worried about physical suffering and death (Jn 10:18), nor did he shrink in walking the way of the cross. For him, cross means to fulfill God's will (cf. Mt 10:38; Lk 9:23). Through the trials,

temptations and tribulations of his life, he realized that the cross was inevitable part of fulfilling the will of God. Therefore, as fruit of doing God's will with joy and commitment, Jesus carried the cross willingly (Jn 12:24; 27-28). That's why he rebuked Peter when Peter was worried about Jesus' physical suffering (cf. Mt 16:28). Five out of seven words of Jesus on the cross, as reported by Luke and John, explain his gracefulness and mercy. This Jesus on the road to Calvary is a splendid light of hope and source of strength to us who are caught up in the web of worldly injustice and selfishness.

Pulpit of the Cross!



Some people believe they should undergo physical suffering in imitation of Jesus's suffering and death. **Crucifixion in the Philippines, for example,** is a devotional practice held every Good Friday, while related practices include carrying wooden crosses, crawling on rough pavement, and self-flagellation. Penitents consider these acts to be mortification of the flesh, and undertake them to ask forgiveness for sins and to express gratitude for favours granted. People often forget the spirit of the Cross of Christ and the mortification encouraged by the teaching Church in our fellowship with the Lenten Christ.

Fulton J. Sheen calls Jesus' passion and death as "the pulpit of the Cross" (Cf. *Life of Christ*, 453). Prior to approaching this pulpit Jesus has already climbed many pulpits, such as his encounters with the poor and needy, rural

disciples, arrogant and hypocritical leaders and even evil forces. The Cross is the final stage of his various moments of obeying the will of God. Our Lenten observances should not lead to self-harm to our body; it should, as prophet Joel long ago proclaimed (2:13), inflict our mind and heart; it should pain my heart rather than my body in walking in the footsteps of Jesus' Cross.

Jesus proclaims on the pulpit of the Cross the gospel of total surrender to God and His way of life. Crosses showing our mercy, forgiveness, gentleness and solidarity with those suffering are the best ones to carry rather than carrying wooden crosses. Selfishness and injustice are the crosses of pain to family and society. Contextual critical look at the world today, and in particular India, generates the cross of anger rather than peaceful co-existence (cf.Thomas Menamparambil, *Stored Anger*,8-10). Neglecting the 'win-win formula' of today's society let this Lenten journey form us to be prophets of Jesus' Cross of mercy and justice!

This journey will lead us to the Risen Lord for a renewed heart and life! May the Risen Lord fill you with a grace of newness! I wish you all a very Joyous Easter!
